
Word from the Editor

As I move into the duties of Vice Commodore, I can only view my duties as the guy who tells you where go. We are going to the Golden Gate Yacht Club, Petaluma Yacht Club, San Francisco Yacht Club, and a host of others. Dinners, Lunches, Parades, and Picnics. I highly encourage all of our members to take part in these. Last year I met several new members with boats who were looking forward to getting involved with the cruise outs we have in mind. On the Racing, we have a myriad of races planned for the 3rd Sundays of the coming months. The race calendar is posted on our website. Jack Machum, Annie Springer, and John Cashman will be our Race Committee this year. My hats off to the three of them as coordinating our club racing activities are a real challenge for me.

A word on the America's Cup. In my estimation, and as the year progresses, even though the race will not be until 2013, we will hear more and more about it. The first large hurtle for our club will be one of safety and courtesy. As I understand it, the boats that want to compete in the America's cup have to come here and win the Louis Vinton race. To give you an idea of how large they are, imagine a boat that has to wait for low tide to come into the bay. The Golden Gate Bridge is 226 Feet off the



water. What that means for our races cruise outs, sail training, and time on the water, is one of safety and courtesy. We need to give them a wide berth, especially during their training as well as during the many qualification races. But all in all, I think we are headed to a banner year for sailing.

A note as your Yacht Racing Association (YRA) delegate. After visiting my first YRA meeting as your delegate, I have two matters of interest to report to you.

- 1. There is a movement within the leadership of the YRA to move the right to mediate appeals from the Clubs to a YRA Committee. There are some clubs that welcome this and others that deplore the idea. There is considerable debate and opposition within the YRA to the idea.
- 2. Races and cruise outs have fallen across the board by 30% at all the clubs. This with one notable exception, the Party Circuit, which has remained level at 411. The feeling is the drop in participation is attributed to a lagging economy and recession more than any public perception of sailing.

All in all, I think our club, because of the dedication of its members and their love of sailing as well as the many social aspects of the sport, remains a public standard of yacht clubs in America

Sail Master's Report

We will be cranking up the sail training program the last weekend of March. In preparation we will hold an instructors seminar on Saturday, March 19. Prior to a luncheon we will reacquaint ourselves, discuss our previous years experience and discuss how to improve our 2011 sessions. After lunch we will do a practice man overboard procedure using the LifeSling. Non-instructors are invited to participate in this event.

The sail training course is four lessons, Saturday and Sunday, two consecutive weekends. Show time is 0900 on each

day for a classroom session of about 1 hour then on to the boats for on the water instruction. The sessions generally last until 1400 to 1500 depending on currents and wind. The boats we use are the Catalina 27. The class is limited to four students and we give active duty personnel priority on the schedule. We realize that when duty calls a class may be missed. We will arrange for a make up of any classes missed because of duty.

The cost is \$100 for active duty and includes the sailing textbook book while in the program. The cost for qualified non active duty is \$165. In Sausalito, a Basic Keel Boat course will cost you \$500 to \$800, so this is one heck of a deal.

We encourage students to do some pre-study before attending the course. Most libraries have a basic book on sailing. The sailing textbook is available at the Travis AFB library. This gives the student a leg up on sailing fundamentals and reduces the amount of classroom time.

Prior to attending the course, students should also go to the lessons page of our web site and watch "KQED Quest, The Physics of Sailing". This is the best description of the aerodynamics of sails we have seen. Non-students will enjoy this excellent video as well.
